
## 1VDG Leo Schaefer

# The Pontiac Lions Club Invites you to Experience a Bit of Local Automotive History



The Pontiac Lions Club is extending an open invitation to attend a special presentation at their January 29th meeting. The meeting will feature guest speaker Mr. Mark Thomas, a Pontiac businessman, entrepreneur and historian. The topic of this presentation will be the newly formed and soon-to-be-opened Pontiac Transportation Museum, of which he is a co-founder.

The City of Pontiac has a rich automotive history that began when it became a major manufacturing center of horse-drawn carriages and later of motor-driven vehicles. During the first decade of the 20th century many start-up companies began making cars, trucks and motorbikes in the City of Pontiac. Soon after, the Pontiac Motor Division and GM Truck constructed the largest truck manufacturing center in the world. During World War II these facilities fed the Arsenal of Democracy with cars, trucks and buses. The Pontiac Transportation Museum will have on display vehicles and ,materials covering well over a century of production.

Mr. Thomas and the highly successful Pontiac-Oakland Museum have combined their collections and resources which will be featured at the new Pontiac Transportation Museum. This will include carriages, early motor vehicles and produced in the city as well as a spectrum of vehicles from the Pontiac Motor Company. The museum has 55,000 square feet of space and is located in the former Crofoot School on Pike Street in Pontiac.

All are invited to enjoy this presentation sponsored by the Pontiac Lions Club. It will be held at 12 noon, January 29th, at the Oakland Schools Technology Center, 1371 N Perry in Pontiac. 

# LIONS CLUBS OF MICHIGAN DEFENSE AGAINST DIABETES PROGRAM (D.A.D.)

The Defense Against Diabetes (D.A.D.) program is an eight-week lifestyle change program developed from the CDC's year-long National Diabetes Prevention Program (NDPP) curriculum. The National Kidney Foundation of Michigan (NKFM) has selected key elements of the NDPP program and made them deliverable in eight, one-hour sessions. Sessions will be facilitated by a trained and certified DPP Lifestyle Coach with experience providing the CDC's program.

The NKFM's Lifestyle Coaches will work alongside Lion's Club members to develop healthier eating habits and introduce physical activity into their weekly routines. Each participant will be provided all the tools and support necessary to succeed at the program. Lifestyle Coaches will be available to participants anytime throughout the program via phone, text, and email.





# LIONS OF MICHIGAN HALL OF FAME OFFICIAL NOMINATION FORM

The LIONS OF MICHIGAN HALL OF FAME is a project of the Lions of Michigan Foundation. The purpose of the Hall of Fame is to recognize and honor those individuals who have had a significant impact on Lionism in Michigan and to preserve a memory and record of their service.

### **SELECTION**

A maximum of seven individuals may be selected annually for enshrinement into the Lions of Michigan Hall of Fame. The inductees shall include up to four living and two deceased individuals. Past International Directors will automatically be inducted at the end of their two year term as International Director, and each year, one Hall of Fame inductee will be selected by a special committee consisting of the current members of the Lions of Michigan Hall of Fame.

### **SELECTION COMMITTEE**

The primary Hall of Fame Selection Committee will be comprised of the members of the Lions of Michigan Foundation's Fund Development and Marketing Committee.

### **NOMINATIONS**

Nominations will be received annually, no later than March 1. All nominations must be made using the Nominating Forms provided by the Lions of Michigan Foundation. All portions of the Nomination Form must be completed in order for a nomination to be considered. A detailed Narrative for each Nominee should accompany the Nomination Form to provide the Selection Committee with additional information about the nominee. However, the Narrative shall have no numerical score.

Nominations may be initiated by an individual or individuals, a Lions Club or a District. Nominations must have the endorsement of the District Cabinet (**one nominee per category**) before they are submitted to the Foundation office. Individuals nominated and not selected, in any given year, may be nominated in a subsequent year through the endorsement of a current District Cabinet.

#### **INDUCTEES**

Inductees and their spouse/guest will be invited guests of the Lions of Michigan Foundation at their scheduled induction ceremony. The time and location of the induction ceremony will coincide with the Foundation's Annual Meeting.

#### **RECORDS**

The Lions of Michigan Foundation will be the official repository of records of the LIONS OF MICHIGAN HALL OF FAME. All records will be retained at the Lions of Michigan State Office.
