An Important Message from International President Dr. Jung-Yul Choi



The outbreak of COVID-19 (coronavirus) is forcing the world to adapt in order to help contain it. Limiting international travel and large gatherings of people is key to global containment strategies.

Given the current state of the virus, and the advisories in place around the world, <u>Lions Clubs</u> <u>nternational is recommending that our leaders avoid international travel</u> to Lions events in order to protect you, our Lions and our communities. Additionally, guest speakers should monitor local health advisories in the area they are visiting.

Lions International has suspended all non-essential travel for headquarters staff. Non-essential travel includes, but is not limited to, Lions events such as MD and district conventions, Campaign 100 trainings, site visits, leadership institutes, events and meetings.

We will move forward with currently scheduled essential travel, including LDUN in New York, the April Board of Directors meeting which has been moved to Chicago, and our International Convention in Singapore, although we are currently evaluating contingencies for convention (more information will be provided in a separate email). Local and area Lions can, of course, continue to host events in compliance with local advisories, but we recommend limiting travel that could potentially jeopardize the health and safety of our leaders and Lions.

Please let me know if you have any questions. I appreciate your cooperation during this challenging time for our organization and the world.

Novel Coronavirus FAQs

Situation Summary

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is closely monitoring an outbreak of respiratory illness caused by a novel (new) coronavirus first identified in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China. On February 11, 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) announced an official name for the disease that is causing the 2019 novel coronavirus outbreak, COVID-19. Additional cases have been identified in a growing number of other <u>international locations</u>, including the United States. There are ongoing investigations to learn more.

Convention Travel to Singapore

Q: Will it be safe to travel to Singapore for the 2020 Lions Clubs International Convention? A: At this time, the spread of COVID-19 is not expected to impact travel to the 2020 Lions Clubs International Convention to Singapore in June. This is a rapidly evolving situation, so it is not possible to know how this disease will progress and what new travel restrictions may or may not be in place this far in advance. If you are in the process of booking pre- or post-convention travel, please be sure to check the terms of your travel insurance policy to see what is covered in the event your plans change. The safety and health of our members is our top priority. We will continue to keep our Lions updated about any pending travel warnings.

Q: How is the novel coronavirus impacting Singapore?

The Government of Singapore raised its Disease Outbreak Response System Condition (DORSCON) from yellow to orange on February 7, 2020. DORSCON level orange means the COVID-19 virus is severe and spreads easily from person to person, but that there is currently no widespread transmission in Singapore and the virus is being contained with moderate disruptions to daily life.

Q: How can I reduce my risk of infection?

A: The Singapore Ministry of Health, CDC, and the World Health Organization have all published similar recommendations on what you can do to reduce your risk of infection. These include:

COVID-19 FAQ

- Washing hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Using an alcoholbased hand sanitizer if soap and water are not available.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve (not your hands) when coughing
 or sneezing.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Practice safe food handling and avoid animal markets.
- Keep your workspace and living spaces clean.

Q: What are the vaccine requirements for traveling to Singapore?

A: You should visit your doctor at least a month before your trip to get vaccines or medicines you may need. For travel to Singapore, all travelers should be up-to-date on routine vaccinations, including measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine, diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis vaccine, varicella (chickenpox) vaccine, polio vaccine, and your yearly flu shot. The CDC also recommends getting vaccinated for Hepatitis A and Typhoid before traveling to Singapore. For a full list of recommended vaccinations, visit the <u>CDC's website</u>.

Please continue to check the travel recommendations from the <u>World Health Organization</u> (WHO), the <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)</u> or your local government alerts for any new updates.

The All-State Band trip to Singapore has already been cancelled due to the Coronavirus outbreak. Our District was in the midst of fundraising for an Oxford student, Caleb Boomer, to go with the band to Singapore.

Caleb has chosen to wait and go with the band to the International Convention in Montreal next year. As we enter the season of Spring and watch trees start to bud and some perennials start to poke thru the soil, I think about all of the things that I have accomplished in the last year. I have made huge strides in the public speaking aspect of my life and in my personal life, as well. I started thinking about what lead me to become a Lion/Lioness and it struck me as a little funny and sad at the same time. I had just gone through a nasty divorce and I had lost my job, so I couldn't see any way to make my life better. A Roseville Lion's Club member (Avery Farmer) had moved in across the street from me. One day I had been sitting on my porch for about 2 hours when he came over to ask me if I was ok. I informed him that I was but that I was locked out of my house and had to wait for one of my kids to come home to let me in. This would still be a few hours away, so he asked me if I wanted to come with him to a Lion's meeting. Since I had nothing else to do, I said "Sure". Well, a few months went by and he asked me to become a member, which I did. We took a trip to the Penrickton Center for Blind Children and I was so humbled by that experience. I was going thru a rough time myself and I realized at that point that I actually had it good. This visit solidified my understanding of what the Lions did. He also took me to one of his Project Kidsight screenings (back then everything went through Children's Hospital) and I was hooked, for sure.

"Life happened" and I quit the Roseville Lions Club. When I met my now husband, he was running for District Governor. He took me on one of his visits to the Eastpointe Lioness where he signed me up without even asking me! Naturally, I was angry that he signed me up without asking me, but the more I went to the meetings the more I liked what they stood for. The members were very nice and we became friends. When he changed clubs and joined the Eastpointe Lions Club, I started going to his club meetings and eventually became a member of the Eastpointe Lions Club.
