District elections were successful. I would like to extend a big thank-you to Elections Chairperson Jim Pettinato, District Administrator Tracy Antrikin, and Credentials Chairperson Rhonda Furby for pulling off the first-time that elections for 11-A2 were conducted via a website! Congratulations to the incoming officers. District Governor for 2020-2021 is Lion Leo Schaefer from the Armada Lions Club. First Vice District Governor for 2020-2021 is Lion James Leach Jr. from the Lake Orion Lions Club. Second Vice District Governor for 2020-2021 is Lion Elliott Hilton from the Novi Lions Club. The Lions of Michigan Service Foundation Trustee is Lion James Boomer from the Lake Orion Lions Club.

Training and resources are available for all Lions in the Learning Center portion of the LCI digital ecosystem located at myapps.lionsclubs.org. Information regarding club/district roles and responsibilities are listed and can be read while practicing good social distancing.







District 11-A2 was able to receive an emergency grant for \$10,000 from the Lions Clubs International Foundation. The grant purchased 400 1-gallon containers of hand sanitizer which were distributed to firefighters and first responders who are combating COVID-19 pandemic in both Macomb and Oakland Counties. The grant was an emergency grant and not a matching grant, therefore no district funds were used.

District 11-A2 still has the District and Club Community Impact Grant that can be used for various projects in our two counties. Available funds are over \$10,000 and can be used during or after the COVID pandemic.

A special congratulations goes out to the Richmond Lions Club for establishing mini pantries throughout the city of Richmond.

The mini pantry program is similar to the little libraries program where one can take a book/leave a book. This program provides families who are not comfortable with asking for help the opportunity to receive assistance. There will be four pantries that will be filled once a week with canned goods that contain protein of some sort (like; soup, spaghetti, tuna, etc.). They are currently constructing more mini pantries to be used at additional locations. For mini pantry information call Lion Lori at (586) 337-1477 or contact any Richmond Lion.

Each club can still hold meetings but will have to use some form of conferencing software. ZOOM is one of the options that is available. Members from the Royal Oak Lions Club appreciate Zoom conferencing because it gives an option for members to attend from afar and not have to rush to a meeting.

If you are holding a club meeting via ZOOM or other electronic means, please distribute that information to all the other members in the district because they may want to join your meeting. You can still ask your Region Chairperson, Zone Chairperson, a governor, or have a representative from one of our charities give a presentation or be your guest at the meeting. Lion Mike Dengate has extended an offer to give a Leader Dog for the Blind update through the use of ZOOM to any club in the district.

Please remember our charities during this time; Leader Dog for the Blind, Eversight, and the Bear Lake Camp. Since donations to charities have decreased, our year end donations to these charities will be greatly appreciated and much needed.

Even though most clubs are not meeting, clubs are still responsible for submitting MMR's to LCI. Those clubs that submitted MMR's for the month of April are Armada, Berkley, Beverly Hills, Birmingham, Clarkston Area, Clawson, Fraser, Hazel Park, Lake Orion, Lathrup Village, Macomb Township, Madison Heights & Area, New Baltimore, Ortonville, Oxford, Richmond, Rochester, Rochester Hills, Romeo, Roseville, Royal Oak, Selfridge Chesterfield, Shelby Township, St. Clair Shores, Sterling Heights, Troy Community, Utica, Warren, Washington, and Wixom-Walled Lake Lions.

Governor Scott, Governor-elect Leo and others met recently with representatives from the Oakland County Homeland Security (Emergency Management) Division to deliver a large amount of hand sanitizer for distribution to front-line emergency services personnel. The hand sanitizer was manufactured at Blake's Cider Mill in Armada and was purchased with funds from a grant obtained through LCIF. Michael Loper, Homeland Security Specialist, said, "The donation by the Lions Clubs of Macomb and Oakland Counties will be distributed for use based on priorities and needs by local healthcare workers, essential staff, and first responders."








Everything in our lives has changed because of the COVID pandemic, with many people either working from home or not working at all. Here is a little story to just show you that it can always be worse:

2020 Lions Bear Lake Summer Camp Status and Updates for Campers, Families and Counselors

Time, Planning and Care

Lapeer, MI - May 10, 2020. Today's message is about Lions Bear Lake Camp's plan for the Summer of 2020. Since March, we have been watching and evaluating the impact of Covid-19 on Lions Bear Lake Camp's plan for the summer, while all along the way, preparing to receive staff and children as normal. As time has elapsed, we have intently listened to Governor Whitmer, Health, Regulatory and accrediting bodies, who have guided us to this point.

As I'm composing this message, I'm sitting next to the waterfront area at camp, as it is one of the original activity areas developed at Lions Bear Lake Camp, 28 years ago. When it was developed, the lake did not hold water properly. A water dam was built by hand, with bricks, as the stories go. Lots of sand needed to be added to make it a nice beach waterfront front area that it is today.

During the "4 Our Kids" Building Campaign, we were able to form a plan and raise the funds to make important alterations to the facility that has resulted in what you see today: a 20' deep lake that provides habitat for fish and game, opportunities for fishing, and universally accessible canoeing and paddle-boating for children across our State. This is in addition to our Universally accessible Low Ropes Challenge Course and Climbing Tower, Dining Hall, Pavilion, Art Center, Nature Center and our cabins. I am reminded that this facility did not start where it is today, rather, it matured and improved given time, planning, and care.

As the Board of Directors, staff, and I have evaluated the evolution of the Coronavirus, we have watched and realized that the systems that camp is dependent upon to keep children safe are not in place for the Summer of 2020. If we take a realistic assessment, given the short time-frame, they are not likely to be able to progress to the point they need to be by the time they are needed for Lions

Bear Lake Camp. This deals with our capacity to safely house our staff, to accommodate children who have multiple health concerns from across the state of Michigan to co-habit in one place, to not becoming a restraint on local healthcare resources ourselves, should Covid-19 infections result here at Lions Bear Lake Camp.

Of greatest concern, is the fact that virtually all of Lions Bear Lake Camp counselors, campers, and even staff, have been listed by the CDC as having increased risk from contracting a Covid-19 infection. Clearly, the health and safety of our kiddos, their families, our Lions, volunteers, and staff are not something we are prepared to place at risk and certainly not at greater risk.

What does this Mean for Summer Camp 2020?

This means for the Summer of 2020, we are transitioning our operations to include summer activities, but we will <u>NOT</u> open our residential operations onsite this summer for check-in of campers.

The staff and I are working diligently to develop many new and exciting offerings for the summer that will be offered online via Facebook and/or other platforms to accommodate our audience. We are collaborating with many organizations across the United States, who are offering programming just like ours, in order to make sure our programs remain universally accessible and top notch.

Both The Visually Impaired Camp and Deaf and Hard of Hearing Camp will continue to be held during the same weeks in July that are already on the calendar. Visually Impaired camp will still be instructed by Stephanie Steffer and the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Camp will still be instructed by Melissa Behnan. There will also be camp counselors joining in on this virtual camp opportunity. Both Stephanie and Melissa will create Facebook Groups (or a more universally accessible platform) in which campers and their families can join. These ladies, and/or myself, will be reaching out to you and your families in order to share the information as soon as it is setup. Once the setup is completed, campers can start

registering!! The registration will be done via Facebook (or a more universally accessible platform), in which we will be asking for demographics and consent forms, which allow your child to participate. This camp is being offered for free, so if you've already paid for registration for the in-person camp, you will be refunded by June 1, 2020. Please look for all of this information to come around June 1st.

The hope is that sometime this fall we will be able to regroup in person, for a day event, to reconnect with our friends and staff! So please stay tuned for that opportunity. Also, the Open House is postponed and we are working to reschedule that in late August and/or combine it with our in-person day event that we are trying to host. Again, please stay tuned for more information.

For those individuals that applied for Camp Counselor positions, we appreciate your application and hope that you will apply again next year!! While we are having camp counselors assist with the Virtual Summer Camp 2020, it is minimal and we have made our selection.

I recognize that everyone is ready for things to return to normal. Given Time, Planning, and Care I expect exactly that, but we care too much about you, our camp family to signal all clear before we are in a position to do so.

My belief in Lions Bear Lake Camp's mission, and in fact the camping industry as a whole, is unshaken. Please understand that there will be other camps that are positioned to open and operate, and our decision is in no way a statement against their choices and ability to safely operate. Rather, it is an honest assessment of what we feel is right for Lions Bear Lake Camp and the children who depend upon us.

Given time, planning and care, Lions Bear Lake Camp will be positioned to be stronger than ever and operating at next-level proficiency as more becomes known and the systems needed to safeguard the lives in our care are not in such a condition of flux.

As we set about the work at hand, thank you for your continued support and belief in the mission of Lions Bear Lake Camp. Truly, we are in this together and will emerge stronger and ready for the next-level given *Time*, *Planning*, *and Care*.

Old Skills, New Friends - Making **Harnesses for Leader Dogs**

After working as an orthotist (a person who makes custom orthopedic devices) for 39 years, my wife and I closed our family business in 2015. Shortly after retiring I started volunteering in the tack room. I was very excited to be part of Leader Dogs for the Blind (LDB) since I grew up nearby and had a family connection.

My daughter worked for several years as a guide dog mobility instructor for English and Spanish-speaking clients. While she worked at LDB, my wife and I had an opportunity to take a tour of the facility. I saw my retirement future as soon as we stepped into the tack shop. This is where the tack shop volunteers assist with assembling and repairing leather harnesses and tie-downs for the dogs. Some of the harnesses are also customized to accommodate a dog or handler's physical stature. When I trained many years ago to become an orthotist, most of the devices were made from leather and metal. Although technology has changed over the years to incorporate more sophisticated materials, I always loved using my old school leather work skills.
