### Scholarship Criteria:

- 1. Must be legally blind and provide verification (letter from optometrist or ophthalmologist or letter from vocational counselor).
- 2. Applicants must be a resident of the State of Michigan and a United States Citizen (International students must provide proof of citizenship) and either attending or accepted by an accredited trade or business school, college or university.
- 3. Applicants must complete the official scholarship application (both sides).
- 4. Must submit two letters of recommendation.
- 5. Must submit an essay outlining why you need the scholarship.
- 6. Must have a minimum GPA of 2.5 (transcript required).
- 7. Completed scholarship applications must be postmarked NO LATER THAN NOVEMBER 30th annually.
- 8. Must attend the Lions of Michigan Forum to accept scholarship during a ceremonial presentation. (Actual check(s) will be issued to the school/university/equipment manufacturer upon submission of documentation. Two weeks notice required).

### Scholarship Selection Process:

- 1. Lions of Michigan Scholarship Committee will review all applications during January.
- 2. This scholarship will be awarded in February annually at the Michigan Forum.

#### DISTRICT 11 A2 DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

PURPOSE: To recognize a District 11 A2 Lion, Lioness, or Leo for sustained, outstanding commitment and dedicated service as a Lion, Lioness or Leo to the Community and District.

### CRITERIA:

- Service must include club & district level participation. MD & LCI level participation is NOT a requirement although can be a plus. (NOTE: This is intended as a District award for service at the District & Club level in this District.)
- Must have served in a leadership role at the Club and District level.
- Demonstrated service in support of one or more of the established District projects & programs.
- Demonstrated service directly involving voluntary service to the Community.
- Must currently be a District 11 A2 Lion, Lioness or Leo in good standing as a full
  member with a minimum of seven years membership in the District at the time of the
  District Convention where this award is to be presented.
- Nominee may NOT have been previous recipient of the Harold Pocklington Service Award. Nominee may NOT be currently serving as an International Director, District Governor or as a Vice District Governor.
- Nominations must be submitted in writing to the Immediate Past District Governor not later than February 1, 2021 in proper format.

### **SELECTION PROCESS:**

- The Honorary Committee, chaired by the IPDG, shall consist of those PDG's who are active members of a District 11A2 Lions Club. The District Governor shall be a part of voting process but may not make a nomination.
- Only one nomination by each member of the Honorary Committee, consisting of Past District Governors, may be submitted during a Lion's year.

- Nominations shall be submitted, in writing, or by email to the most recent IPDG.
  Following the selection, the IPDG shall be responsible to obtain the plaque and
  medallion. IPDG will also be responsible for having them engraved and shall present the
  award at the Annual District Convention Banquet. If the current IPDG is unable to do the
  presentation the next previous IPDG will do the presentation.
- Information collected along with the medallions and engraving for plaques shall be shared with the next IPDG following the presentation of the Distinguished Service Award and the last meeting of the Honorary committee.

In order to secure complete nomination information, a PDG may need to contact the person being nominated. This information should remain confidential within the Honorary Committee.

In the event that a PDG is nominated for the Distinguished Service Award, the Chairperson of the Honorary Committee (or other designated chair if the IPDG is a nominee), upon receipt of the completed nomination form, shall notify the nominated PDG. Thereafter, the nominated PDG shall not participate in the selection process during the Lion's year of the nomination.

### **VOTING PROCESS:**

- IPDG will call for a meeting of the Honorary Committee (consisting of active PDG's
  who have served for District 11A2) no less than 30 days prior to Annual District
  Convention. A quorum of the selection committee shall be no less than one third of the
  eligible members. If there is not a quorum or if no candidate receives the stated amount
  of votes, the award shall not be given in that year.
- Voting shall be by written ballot or via telephone conference call (if necessary). The
  recipient must receive one more than 50% of the ballots cast. If no nominee receives 1
  more than 50% of the ballots cast, then the committee will take the top two (2)
  nominations and revote. Winner will be determined by who receives 50% plus one vote.
- No proxy votes will be allowed and a Past Pocklington Award recipient will count the votes as directed by the IPDG.
- The Honorary Committee will be asked to keep the winning nomination a secret until Annual District Convention.
